Memoirs That Read Like Adventure Stories

Callahan, Steven. Adrift: Seventy-Six Days Lost at Sea. Houghton Mifflin, 1986. This is a riveting story of survival in an inflatable raft, fighting off sharks, hunger, and the elements, a bestseller when it was published.

Casey, Susan. **The Devil's Teeth: A True Story of Obsession and Survival Among America's Great White Sharks**. Holt, 2005.

The author followed 2 biologists to the wild and spooky Farallon Islands off California, the only place where these sharks can be studied in their natural habitat.

Grann, David. The **Lost City of Z: A Tale of Deadly Obsession**. Doubleday, 2009. Grann sets off to follow the trail of Percy Fawcett, an early-twentieth century British explorer who ventured in to the Amazon jungle and never returned. Does Grann discover—or suffer—Fawcett's fate?

Grant, Richard. **God's Middle Finger: Into the Lawless Heart of the Sierra Madre.** Free Press, 2008.

Drug runners, bandits, and corrupt police inhabit the lawless, scenic western mountains of Mexico, ready to kill an intruder at a moment's notice. Despite the danger, thrill-seeking Grant just can't stay away; his account of his travels is compulsively readable.

Harrer, Heinrich. **Seven Years in Tibet**. Dutton, 1954.

The wonderful classic tale of a World War II German POW who escaped and trekked in winter across Tibet to the (then) closed city of Lhasa and became tutor to the Dalai Lama.

Kane, Joe. Running the Amazon. Knopf, 1989.

A riveting account of how a handpicked team of 11 adventurous souls attempted to kayak the entire length of the Amazon River.

Krakauer, John. Into Thin Air: A Personal Account of the Mt. Everest Disaster. Villard, 1997. The author was part of the ill-fated team of climbers that were overtaken by tragedy in 1996 and shares his anguish as well as a history of Everest attempts.

Mahoney, Rosemary. **Down the Nile: Alone in a Fisherman's Skiff**. Little, Brown, 2007. A single woman becomes obsessed with the idea of buying a boat and rowing down the Nile, despite cultural obstacles.

O'Hanlon, Redmond. *Into the Heart of Borneo*. Random House, 1985. A hilarious and fascinating trek into the jungle told by the ditzy British academic who attempted it.
